

Happy holidays, everyone, and welcome to the 2023 A Very GNV Holiday Parade! My name is Jay Anderson, assistant to the president of Santa Fe College, and I'm your announcer today.

As we wait for the parade to reach us, we're being entertained by Smooth Flava, a line dancing organization with dozens of members who contribute to the fun, festive and celebratory culture of the City of Gainesville through events and classes all year round.

Special thanks our wonderful pre-parade entertainment! We've been fortunate to have Smooth Flava dancing here, under the instruction of Wanda Lloyd.

We're happy you could join us for the first holiday parade in the City of Gainesville since the 1990s. We're thrilled to have more than 90 participants in this parade, and especially excited that former Florida Gators Head Football Coach Steve Spurrier is appearing today as our grand marshal.

As you may know, the parade starts at West University Avenue and 6th Street and travels approximately one mile, to end at the Alachua County Public Schools Administration Building at 620 East University Avenue.

We wish to thank the generous sponsors who made this day possible. This is a parade for the community by the community. We are most grateful to our title sponsors: UF Health, Cox Communications and MARC Radio. Our gold sponsors are The Collier Companies, GFL Environmental, and Morgan & Morgan. You'll also see some of them appearing in the parade.

And we have to give an enormous shout out to the Gainesville City Commission, particularly At-Large Commissioner Cynthia Moore Chestnut who proposed this parade and has been its champion, guiding the planning and fundraising—and the day has finally arrived.

1. The City of Gainesville Police Department leads the 2023 *A Very GNV Holiday Parade* with an appearance by officers of the motorcycle unit. They are joined by members of the Alachua County Sheriff's Office and the City of Alachua Police Department.
2. The Eastside High School Naval Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps marches as the parade color guard. Please stand for the Presentation of the Colors.
3. Grand Marshal Coach Steve Spurrier's life in Gainesville began in 1963 when he came to the University of Florida as a quarterback from Johnson City, Tennessee. He won the Heisman Trophy as a senior in 1966 before being selected in the first round of the 1967 NFL Draft by the San Francisco 49ers. Spurrier rejoined the Gators as head coach in 1990, winning their first Southeastern Conference title in 1991. Named SEC Coach of the Year five times, he led the Gators to six conference titles and its first national title. Florida Field was renamed Steve Spurrier-Florida Field in his honor.

4. Alachua County Sheriff Emery Gainey is a Sapphire Level sponsor of today's parade. Sheriff Gainey appears with a group of Sheriff Explorers. The Sheriff's Office is committed to serving the community by building and developing relationships with people across Alachua County to enhance personal safety and quality of life.
5. Representative Yvonne Hinson, our Democratic lawmaker from Gainesville, was first elected to the District 20 seat in the Florida House of Representatives in 2020. Representative Hinson graduated from the University of Florida, served on the Gainesville City Commission from 2012 to 2015, and previously spent 14 years as an elementary school principal.
6. The Gainesville City Commission performs such duties as passing the city's budget and approving the ordinances and resolutions and are committed to bettering the quality of life for all neighbors. The commissioners are responsible to the neighbors of Gainesville. Our commission consists of Gainesville Mayor Harvey Ward, At-Large Commissioner Cynthia Chestnut, At-Large Commissioner Reina Saco, District 1 Commissioner Desmon Duncan-Walker, District 2 Commissioner Ed Book, District 3 Commissioner Casey Willits, and District 4 Commissioner Bryan Eastman.
7. The City of Gainesville A Very GNV Holiday Float was first constructed for the 150th anniversary of the city's founding and features some of our famous landmarks. Riding the float are Sapphire Level sponsors Gainesville Fire Rescue Chief Joe Dixon and Gainesville Police Chief Lonnie Scott along with University of Florida mascots Albert and Alberta.
8. Miss Gainesville Alexandra de Roos is a 20-year-old alumna of the School of American Ballet in New York City and a current student at the University of South Florida. She has attended summer ballet intensives at the School of American Ballet, Pacific Northwest Ballet, American Ballet Theatre, Next Generation Ballet, and the Rock School for Dance Education. Miss de Roos believes, "anyone who wants to dance should have the opportunity to, and my mission is to make that dream a reality."
9. Tamari Davis is a graduate of Oak Hall and four-time AAU Junior Olympic Games winner who qualified for her first U.S. World team at the USATF Outdoor Championships, clocking a time of 10.99 seconds to finish third in the women's 100m final.
10. UF Health is a Title Sponsor here today and we're most grateful for their support and participation in the 2023 *A Very GNV Holiday Parade*. Their Mobile Stroke Treatment Unit is the first and only response vehicle of its kind in Florida. It is specially equipped with a portable CAT scanner on board and can diagnosis and treat stroke on scene.
11. The Visionaires –a local civic club – was established in 1938 by eight local African-American women who wanted to enhance the cultural and educational opportunities for the African-American community in Gainesville. Eighty-five years later, the organization is still thriving. The Visionaires provide financial support for community-based organizations, award annual scholarships to college-bound students, raise awareness for important community issues and support the local performing arts scene.
12. Mt. Pleasant United Methodist Church was founded on July 16, 1867 with the Reverend Isaac Davis serving as the first pastor. This is the oldest Black congregation in Gainesville and holds its place in history as a social and religious center for the Pleasant Street neighborhood. Settled at

the same time as the City, the Pleasant Street neighborhood is approximately 150 years old and contains an important element of Gainesville's urban and cultural history.

13. The Pleasant Street Neighborhood Association was established in the 1980s to keep the neighborhood a wonderful place to live. Representing Gainesville's oldest, most intact, comprehensive African-American neighborhood, this association includes families who have lived in the Pleasant Street area for decades. Its historic structures include Friendship Baptist Church, the Mt. Pleasant United Methodist Church, and the old Mount Carmel Church along with the A. Quinn Jones Home and School.
14. The 352 Marching Band is a community marching band that specializes in bringing music and spirit to parades and other cultural events. The marching band is open to members of the community and all musicians are welcome. Today they appear in the 2023 *A Very GNV Holiday Parade* along with banner attendants and Flag Corps.
15. Larry Rovak is a member of the Florida Antique Bucket Brigade and brings to our parade his antique fire engine. The Florida Antique Bucket Brigade is a statewide group of firefighting history enthusiasts, many of whom have their own fire trucks spanning from the early hand-drawn days to modern response vehicles.
16. ZION SOLDIERZ RIDING CLUB is a non-profit organization committed to building a ministry of motivated members. This motorcycle group serves others by combining their deep faith with love of riding to support the community and give back.
17. Morgan & Morgan is a Gold Level sponsor of today's 2023 *A Very GNV Holiday Parade* and we would like to thank them for their generous support. Morgan & Morgan is America's largest personal injury law firm with over 900 trial-ready attorneys and thousands of capable support team members. They are located in all 50 states and have recovered over \$15 billion for their clients. "Morgan & Morgan, For the people, not the powerful."
18. The Sugarhill Homecoming Reunion banner is carried by Ms. Cynthia Williams and Val Jenkins. Both are native Sugarhillians who now reside with their own families in other areas. Each year this group comes together for three days to share memories of growing up on the hill. Sugarhill is located between 4th Avenue and Waldo Road intersection, near Evergreen Cemetery. This small section of Gainesville is celebrated each year as residents remember their ancestors and celebrate their shared history.
19. The Sugarhill Homecoming King and Queen are Mr. Curtis Rowe and Mrs. Mildred Dewberry. Mr. Row is 93-years-old, and Mrs. Dewberry is 83-years-old. Mr. Rowe, who is now retired, worked many years for Curtis Newsome and Mrs. Dewberry is a well-known musician who has traveled as a gospel singer.
20. The Dazzling Black Hat Divas are a society of women who support all women. They promote family, friends, community, travel and fun. Though all members are queens, they are under the leadership of Queen Number One, Mrs. Susie Mosley and Vice Queen Sherrian Thomas. This chapter, which began 14 years ago, is part of a nationwide organization.

21. Bishop Christopher Stokes is pastor of New Beginning Christian Worship Center in Micanopy and the executive director of the Willie Mae Stokes Community Center, which he established to serve the youth of Alachua County and surrounding communities.
22. The Town of Micanopy is here today with town commissioners riding in the 2023 *A Very GNV Holiday Parade*. Elected officials include Commissioners Judy Galloway, Jiana Williams, Ginny Mance, Kevin Putansu and Ken Wessberg. Earlier this year, the Town of Micanopy was named one of “The 10 Best Small Towns in Florida” by Travel and Leisure Magazine.
23. The Santa Fe College Student Builders Association has provided this playhouse float, built by students in the program. Aboard is Santa Fe College President Dr. Paul Broadie, the fifth president of this institution, wishing all of us a happy holiday season. Earning a salary for on-the-job training and graduating debt-free are just two of the many benefits for students in the construction trade apprenticeship programs at Santa Fe College.
24. The Patricia Hilliard Nunn Sankofa Legacy Dancers and Drummers are a West African Dance and Drum group that performs traditional West African dances. The members are wearing African attire with musicians playing two types of drums, djembe and doudou. Dr. Patricia Hilliard Nunn was a UF faculty member and the foremost scholar on African American studies in the region. She died in 2020. This group performs as part of her legacy.
25. The Real Rosewood Foundation is a historical foundation committed to advancing public interest in the history around Rosewood, its legacy, and the communities that call it home. The work is propelled by research, education, and immersive public programs. Lizzie Robinson Jenkins is CEO and Founder of the Real Rosewood Foundation. You can hear her weekly on the Queen Lizzie Podcast recorded in Steve Spurrier's Podcast Room.
26. Zeta Phi Beta Sorority—both the Delta Sigma Zeta Chapter and the Mu Epsilon Chapter – are walking in the parade. For 103 years, the women of Zeta Phi Beta have upheld their founders’ vision, setting themselves apart as an organization built on the ideals of scholarship, service, sisterhood and finer womanhood. Finer womanhood celebrates the standards, morals, customs and attributes all women strive to possess.
27. The Latina Women’s League is empowering women and community in Gainesville. Founded in 2005, the Latina Women’s League is a nonprofit organization dedicated to contributing to Hispanic and Latinx culture and art. Dressed in folkloric outfits from Colombia, Puerto Rico, Cuba, Peru and other nations, they are a colorful entry in the 2023 *A Very GNV Holiday Parade*.
28. The Manhood Youth Development Foundation is a local mentoring program created in 2010 to give young Black boys the support needed to finish school and go on to college and a career. The idea is to transform the present and lead young people to a brighter future. The Manhood Youth Development Foundation is here with a group of these impressive young people walking in the parade.
29. Star Center Theater and Special Events School of Performing Arts are under the direction of Poinsettia J. Greene. The baton-twirling majorettes are performing to music. Majorettes are primarily associated with marching bands during parades. The flag corps is a team of performers who do choreographed dances and routines with various equipment to enhance and interpret

the marching band or drum show. Elementary and middle school children were taught in camp this summer and are now able to perform in this 2023 A Very GNV Holiday Parade.

30. Gainesville Health and Fitness is here with garlands, candy canes, gingerbread men, and the Grinch in a sled—all to celebrate a healthy holiday season. Gainesville Health and Fitness, the premier health and fitness destination in Gainesville, Florida, is celebrating its 45-year anniversary. Since its inception in 1978, Gainesville Health and Fitness has been at the forefront of promoting wellness and physical fitness in the community.
31. Chestnut Funeral Home is a Sapphire Level sponsor for today's parade and we are grateful for their support. This is one of Gainesville's oldest businesses. Since 1914, four generations of Chestnuts have owned and managed the business, touching thousands of families across a timeline that spans more than a century. Many Chestnut family members have been elected to local, county and state office, advancing causes from integration to education. Today, Charles "Chuck" Chestnut IV is an Alachua County Commissioner and Cynthia Chestnut is a Gainesville City Commissioner and the champion behind the 2023 *A Very GNV Holiday Parade*.
32. The Alachua County Supervisor of Elections Office is here with patriotic and holiday themed colors. The Supervisor of Elections is Kim A. Barton, elected in 2016 as the first Black person to serve in this role in Alachua County. The Supervisor of Elections and her staff are chiefly responsible for administering elections and voter registration across the county.
33. The Alachua County Public Schools are represented by this cheerful gingerbread school with candy accents. Dedicated to giving students the knowledge, skills, and personal characteristics to be lifelong thinkers and independent learners, the district is led by a board consisting of Chair Diyonne McGraw, Vice Chair Leanetta McNealy, and members Tina Certain, Sarah Rockwell and Kay Abbitt. The Superintendent of Alachua County Public Schools is Shane Andrew.
34. The Alachua County Public Schools Transportation Department is here in a big yellow school bus. The department director is Dr. Dontarrius Rowls and the mission of all Alachua County school bus drivers is to provide safe, efficient, and effective student transportation to and from school. The school bus is truly an extension of the classroom and a vital part of our schools. The department says, "We are committed to the success of every student!"
35. Alachua County Emerging Leaders is a resource for and about young people. Their vision is for this community to become an increasingly desirable place for diverse, talented young people to flourish. They work to connect young leaders at social and professional events, inform Alachua County residents of issues and opportunities, and involve young professionals in projects and initiatives to help them grow professionally.
36. The Boy Scouts of America are camping on a flatbed trailer for the 2023 *A Very GNV Holiday Parade*. We are very lucky that our area has both girls and boys in our units and some of the largest packs and troops in existence! They enjoy activities such as camping, hiking, rock climbing, swimming, sailing and go to amazing adventures nationwide. Find out more at beascout.org.
37. P.K. Yonge Marching Band, known as the Blue Wave Marching Band, is an award-winning competitive band program. Their mission is to create an environment through music and the

arts that will foster, challenge, motivate, develop and demand the students to become responsible and mature young adults in all facets of their life.

38. Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority's Eta Phi Sigma Chapter is accompanied by its Philo and Rhoer affiliates. This historically Black Sorority was founded by seven educators in 1922 at Butler University in Indianapolis, Indiana and is a member of the National Panhellenic Council. Their mission is to enhance the quality of life for women and their families in the U.S. and globally through community service, civil and social action. Their motto is "Greater Service, Greater Progress," and they are accompanied today by their mascot "The Poodle."
39. The City of Gainesville Police Department is accredited by the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies. This full-service, community oriented police department is committed to partnering with neighbors to make Gainesville one of the most livable cities in the United States. Here you see a recruiter vehicle along with some of the officers who daily prevent crime, enforce the law and enhance our quality of life.
40. The Eastside High School Naval Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps is a program that assists young people who are interested in joining the military later in life. Students can take NJROTC as a class during the day or afterschool and they participate in numerous competitions throughout the year. Archery, Rifle skills, Drill Team, Honor Guard and knowledge-based competitions hone the skills of the cadets.
41. Communication Workers of America Local 3170, known to most locally as CWA, is a workers' union that proudly represents and serves employees of the City of Gainesville, Gainesville Regional Utilities, the Gainesville Housing Authority and the Alachua County Library District.
42. GFL Environmental is a Gold Level Sponsor of the 2023 *A Very GNV Holiday Parade* and we are thankful for their support. GFL is the only major diversified environmental services company in North America offering services in solid waste management and liquid waste management. We are grateful for the work GFL Environmental does to keep our community clean and healthy and to encourage greater environmental responsibility through safe, accessible and cost-effective solutions.
43. Joyce Vinson Family Daycare Home, where Learning is Fun, is open 24 hours seven days a week. The mission of the African Methodist Episcopal Church is to minister to the social, spiritual and physical development of all people. Pastor Ron Rawls, leader of Greater Bethel AME Church, was this year's recipient of the Thomas A. Wright Leadership Award from the Alachua County branch of the NAACP.
45. Phillip and Sons Funeral Home, founded by Bernard Phillip II, strengthens the sense of connection and community among the families it serves. Having begun his career at Chestnut Funeral Home before pursuing a degree in mortuary science, Bernard Phillip worked for a number of prestigious funeral homes on the way to establishing this Melrose business. The

traditions surrounding burial in the Black community continue to survive today thanks to leaders like Phillip and Sons.

46. The Neighborhood Housing and Development Corp. strongly believes that each individual and family unit deserves an equal opportunity to live in decent, affordable housing. To make this a reality, NHDC has initiated housing development and rental property services, provides helpful tools including budget and financial counseling, and helps first-time homebuyers navigate the process more smoothly.
47. Cumbia Collective is a traditional Colombian Cumbia group that is sponsored by the owners of Abuela's and Flaco's. They are costumed in traditional Christmas colors representing their cultural heritage. Cumbia Collective members represent a tradition of carnival parades from all over South America but specifically Baranquilla, Colombia.
48. The Alachua County Branch of the NAACP was chartered on June 11, 1945 and serves to advocate for and protect the civil rights of our community. Members of the NAACP make a difference every day in the fight for social justice and civil rights in Gainesville and across the country.
49. MARC Radio is a Title Sponsor of the 2023 *A Very GNV Holiday Parade*. We are most appreciative for the support. MARC Radio has stations in the Gainesville-Ocala area, Orlando, Melbourne and in Dallas-Fort Worth, Texas. Their mission is to reimagine new and legacy media to connect with and super serve the community.
50. The Urban Yachting Club has a holiday rhyme: He was a mean one – Mr. Grinch, but he had a change of heart. He heard about the Holiday Parade, and now he's taking part. But the Grinch is not like me and you, he prefers a boat parade. But he will make this one do, so you need not be afraid. The Grinch joined the Urban Yachting Club, which really made things happen. He formed a crew of Max and Cindy Lou Who, and he made himself the Captain. He won't steal your tree or take your roast beast, but a green pirate he is now. So I think some good advice is—best not to cross his bow.
51. LifeSouth Community Blood Centers is the sole supplier of blood products to the hospitals in Gainesville and the surrounding communities. We will be celebrating our 50 year anniversary in 2024.
52. Florida Horse Riders are a popular attraction at any parade. The group was founded under Douglas Green 2001. It consists of 15 riders who actively participate monthly. They love parades, trail riding and helping others ride. So come and join them, "Can I Get A Yee Haw?"
53. Oelrich Construction, established in 2004, has grown into a trusted construction management company with more than 30 professional team members. Oelrich is a Sapphire Level sponsor of today's parade, and we're grateful for their contribution. They appear today with a GHA-ville float that mirrors the theme of Dr. Seuss' Who-ville with a few lucky youth participants appearing as little Whos and some of the wonderful GHA staff. The Gainesville Housing Authority is an advocate and provider of affordable housing for families in Gainesville.
59. Expressions Learning Arts Academy promotes academic achievement by incorporating the arts, particularly the performing arts, into their curriculum. 68. The Pride Community Center of North Central Florida is a safe space for the LGBTQ+ community. This nonprofit charitable organization serves to foster and enhance the wellbeing and visibility of people of all gender expressions and sexual orientations with inclusivity for all. Committed to providing education and resources in a supportive environment, today the Pride Community Center brings together allied LGBTQ+ organizations marching with parade banners for a Rainbow Holiday Season.
69. Eden Park at Ironwood Apartments is celebrating its 20th anniversary and is a Sapphire Level sponsor of today's parade. This is one of the first affordable housing complexes in Gainesville to provide low-cost internet in what has swiftly become a digital world. Eden Park has 104 affordable apartment homes and a childcare facility on site that offers free head start services.

72. Upper Room Ministries is a set of outreach ministries led by the Upper Room of Greater Gainesville Church of God in Christ. For 23 years, Upper Room has offered support, mentoring and guidance. Today's parade entry focuses on young people and the Youth Impact Ministry.
73. The Infamous Diamonds of Gainesville are a majorette dance team founded in 2016. Their routines are always the highlight of any event. This competition team consists of dancers of all ages, sizes and backgrounds. They perform complex steps, acrobatic flips, choreographed tricks, and make our day here even more special. The Diamonds have performed at multiple University of Florida events, including the Homecoming SoulFest and parade, the UF Black Student Assembly and the annual Florida International Step Show.
74. The Invictus Fencing Club is dedicated to the ongoing development and growth of fencing and para-fencing programs, athletes and coaches in a safe, inclusive and affordable environment. No equipment or experience is necessary. Fencing was originally a form of military training and started to evolve into a sport in the 14th or 15th century in both Germany and Italy.
75. The Alachua County Library District is celebrating the season with a library cart drill team. These staffers are walking with the carts used to shelve books, festively decorated, doing short weaving and formation routines. The Alachua County Library District is an independent special district and the sole provider of public library services to approximately 271,000 citizens in urban and rural communities. There are 12 branch locations and two bookmobiles.
76. Whitaker Wellness Spa specializes in person-centered therapy creating individualized wellness plans that treat the mind and body. They offer on-site and virtual life coaching sessions and custom massage therapy services to help create a positive sense of well-being. Whitaker Wellness Spa: creating a better YOU, inside and out.
77. The Ministries of Expressive Song and Dance, created by Elois Waters, is a nonprofit affordable dance company for children and adults. Created in 1995, the studio teaches many styles including ballet, gospel, Hip Hop, lyrical and modern dance. Today the students of this dance ministry are walking and performing to wish all the very best of this festive season.
78. Caring and Sharing Learning School is a place where every child can learn. Caring and Sharing is a 2010 National Title 1 Distinguished School, a 2017 National High Flying School, and a 2017 National Blue Ribbon School. The vision is to provide the best academic and personal education for students in an environment which promotes achievement, personal excellence and a sense of pride.
79. Touching Hearts at Home offers an array of home care services for seniors, people living with medical conditions or disabilities, those in transition from hospital to home, and those who need support from a professional caregiver. Today they bring a 1954 candy apple red classic Chevy truck decorated for the holidays.

80. Mainstreet Daily News is a Sapphire Level parade sponsor. This local, independent news outlet is dedicated to telling the story of Gainesville and its surrounding area. Its mission is to inform, engage and inspire readers to make a difference in the communities and neighborhoods it serves.
81. Siatech MYcro School is a tuition-free public charter high school where student ages range from 14-24. The curriculum is a blend of cutting-edge educational software and in-person instruction in math, English as a Second Language, English, reading, science and social studies. Class sizes are small, and students work at their own pace with face-to-face support from certified teachers.
82. Bartley Temple United Methodist Church began with a small group of worshippers who met for prayer on Sundays. The church was constructed in 1950 and named after the Reverend Henry Bartley, Jr., who helped raise the funds needed and supported the worshippers until the doors opened. The congregation is led by the Reverend Mary L. Mitchell and the Reverend Milford Griner.

This is a zany group of local clowns being silly to celebrate the Holiday season! It involves a marching contingent of kazoo players, a color guard of hula hoops, stilt walkers, ribbon wands, a drum major playing rubber chickens and a poodle in a tuxedo!
86. Alexandra Book is a stilt walker, dancer and aerialist. Archaeological evidence suggests that stilt walking began in ancient Egypt and China around 3,500 years ago. In those days, stilts were used for doing work like navigating marshy areas or working in flooded fields.
87. Gainesville Dollz is a group of majorettes and drill team for boys and girls. The mission and vision is to instill a great love of dance while inspiring self-confidence, discipline and respect.
88. Gainesville Fire Rescue is an all hazards response organization. These firefighters do more than put out flames. They also specialize in Emergency Medical Services, Technical Rescue, Hazardous Materials Response, Confined Space Rescues, and stand ready to respond to any threat to the safety of the Gainesville community. Today GFR has brought an aerial and command vehicle for the 2023 *A Very GNV Holiday Parade*.

89. The Santa Fe High School Cheer Team includes committed coaches, supportive parents and most of all the amazing cheerleaders! These year-round scholar-athletes cheer on their school sports teams, participate in clubs and perform at school functions and events. Moreover, they are a competitive team that aims to be the best of the best.
90. Matchmaker Realty of Alachua County serves the community in and around Gainesville. With this festive trolley, the folks at Matchmaker have the experience and expertise to help home buyers and sellers navigate the North Florida home market. This team understands that buying or selling a home is a major life event and are here to help any time of year.
91. The Concrete Rose Foundation is a nonprofit organization that provides advocacy and assistance to minority youth through targeted mentorship. The goal is to minimize the risk factors faced by adolescents in underserved communities. The Concrete Rose Foundation serves youth in Alachua County.
92. The University of Florida Gator Band was the first college marching band in the state of Florida and is finishing its 110th year of service to the University, City, State and Country. Having led every UF Homecoming parade through downtown Gainesville, the band has also represented the United States at the 2012 Olympics, the 2022 St. Patrick's Day Festivities in Ireland, and this June will represent the US at the 80th Anniversary of D-Day in Normandy France. The group will perform numerous UF, pop and holiday songs along the parade route.
